Foster Parent Liability Checklist: Information You Need To Know Before Agreeing to Foster

- GET ANSWERS TO THESE QUESTIONS AND HAVE AN APPROPRIATE AGENCY REPRESENTATIVE SIGN OFF ON HIS OR HER RESPONSES.
- MAKE SURE YOU ARE PROVIDED WITH COPIES OF ALL POLICIES THAT OUTLINE YOUR RIGHTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES AS A FOSTER PARENT, INCLUDING ANY FOSTER PARENT BILL OF RIGHTS AND GRIEVANCE PROCEDURES.
- 1. If I am accused of breaching my responsibilities as a foster parent, if I am accused of maltreating a foster child by the State social services agency, or if social services performs an investigation into my home due to an allegation that I have acted improperly in my role as a foster parent:
 - a. What are my rights to know that I have been accused?
 - b. Who will inform me of the accusation, and how will I be informed?
 - c. What rights do I have to be present when a foster child who may be the subject of the investigation is interviewed?
 - d. What rights do I have to be notified of an interview of my own children (if applicable) and to be present when they are interviewed?
 - e. What other rights do I have during the investigation? Specifically:
 - i. Right to a foster parent advocate?
 - ii. How do I obtain an advocate?
 - f. How long will the investigation last?
 - g. How will I be informed of the outcome of the investigation?
 - h. What will happen to the children in my home? What is the process for determining if they are to be removed?
- 2. If I am found to have breached my responsibilities as a foster parent or to have maltreated a foster child:
 - a. What rights to I have to file a grievance? What is the process for filing that grievance?
 - b. Who hears the grievance?
 - c. What rights do I have to an attorney or foster parent advocate at the grievance hearing?
 - d. What rights do I have to present evidence or confront those who say I have done something wrong?

- e. What can the person or committee hearing my grievance do if I am found not to have done what I am accused of?
- f. If my grievance is denied, how would I appeal?
- g. How far "up the chain" can I appeal? Can I get a court hearing?
- 3. If the state social services agency believes I have maltreated, neglected, or abused a foster child, what happens to that information?
 - a. Is it put on any kind of registry or in any database?
 - b. Who would have access to it?
 - c. What is the evidentiary standard for determining that I have maltreated a foster child?
 - d. Who makes that determination?
 - e. How would I be notified of it? What details would I be told?
 - f. How would I challenge it?
- 4. If I believe the agency is mistreating me or is violating my rights as a foster parent:
 - a. What is the process for filing a grievance or complaint?
 - b. Am I entitled to assistance from a foster parent advocate or attorney?
 - c. What is the process for presenting my grievance or complaint? Who hears it? How long from the time I file must it be heard?
 - d. What power do those hearing my grievance have to give me relief or to order the agency to grant my request?
 - e. If I am not satisfied with the outcome of that hearing, how do I appeal? How far "up the chain" can I go? Can I get a court hearing?
- 5. What happens if a foster child, birth parent, or someone else makes a claim that I have injured or harmed a child in my custody?
 - a. Will the State provide me with an attorney free of charge?
 - b. Does the State provide me with liability insurance? If so, how do I go about getting it? What does it cover and what is not covered, and in what amounts?
 - c. If a court finds I did something that harmed a child and am legally responsible for damages, will the State pay, or will I have to pay?
